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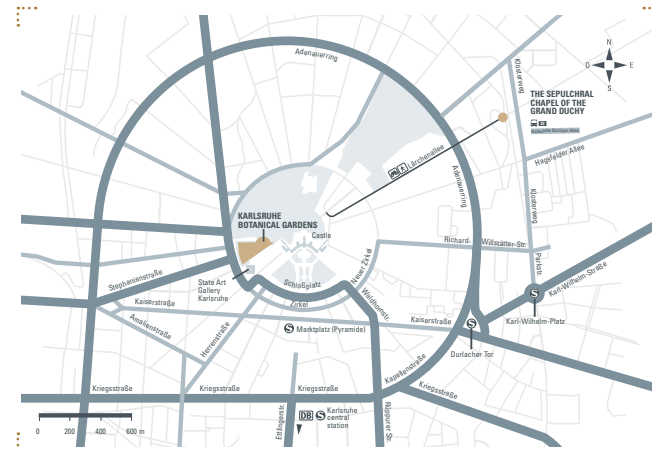

HOW TO FIND US



By public transport: Take the tram to the "Marktplatz" stop and walk from there to the Palace and Palace Gardens and then directly along the "Lärchenallee" to the Sepulchral Chapel (approx. 1 km from the Palace); or take the tram to the "Durlacher Tor" stop and then bus number 30 to the "Büchiger Allee" stop. Directions by car: via Klosterweg (up to house no. 11)

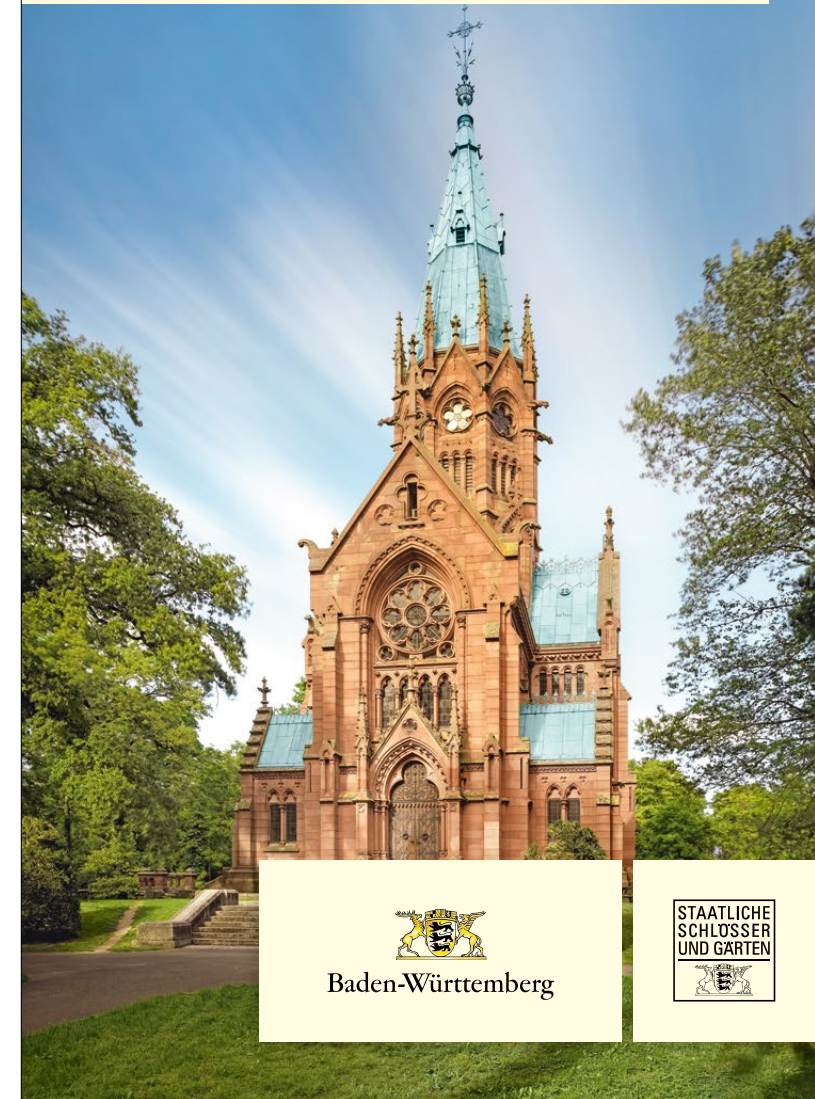

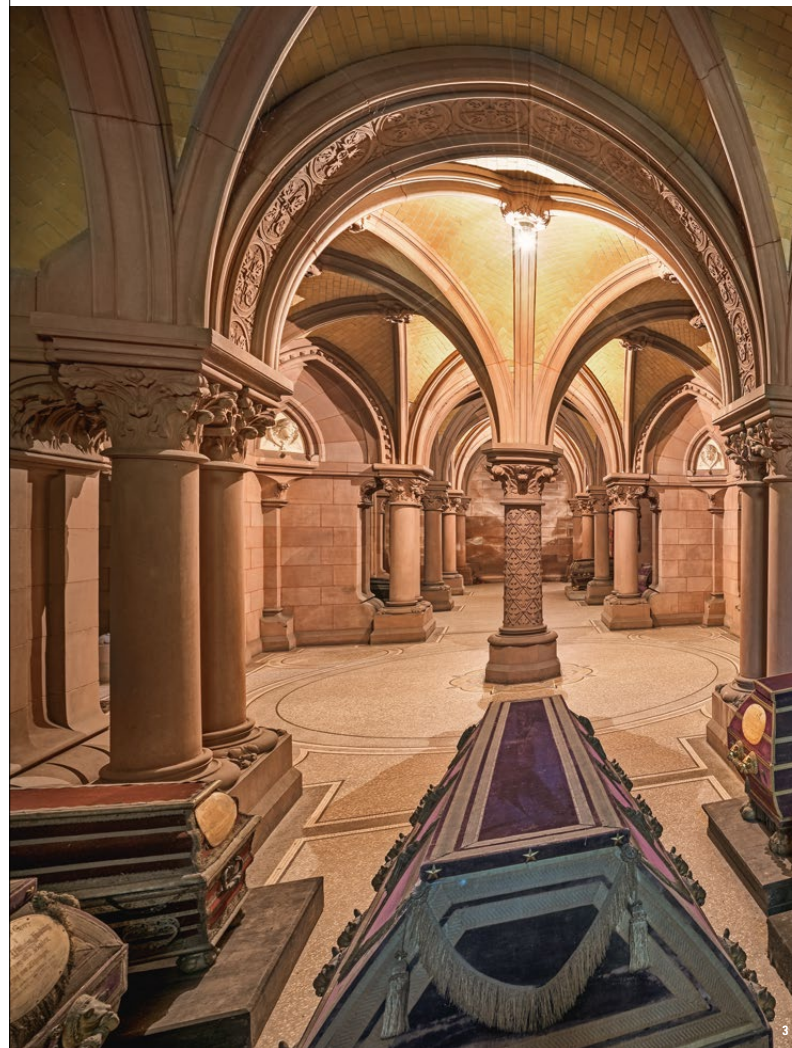

In the heart of the Hardtwald forest, at the end of the tree-lined Lärchenallee, lies the atmospheric sepulchral chapel, the only edifice built during the Grand Duchy in Karlsruhe to have survived World War II unscathed.

Located at the edge of the *Fasanengarten (Peacock Gardens)* in Karlsruhe, the mausoleum is one of the region's most significant historical monuments, and is the burial site of five of the seven grand dukes of Baden.

A PLACE OF PRIVACY FOR BADEN'S RULERS

The mausoleum was commissioned by Grand Duke Friedrich I of Baden and his wife, Luise of Prussia. They wanted their son, who died in 1888, to rest in the "secluded tranquillity of the woods". Until this time, the rulers of Baden had been buried in the castle church of St. Michael in Pforzheim or in the crypt of the Karlsruhe town church—places that the Grand Duke and his wife could not visit without being on public display. The discreet family chapel was a statement of the separation between their public and private lives. The sepulchral chapel was modelled after *the mausoleum in the park of the Charlotten-*



burg Palace in Berlin. That mausoleum was constructed in 1810 for Queen Luise of Prussia, the grandmother of the Grand Duchess.

AN ARTISTIC AND ARCHITECTURAL MASTERPIECE

The architect, Friedrich Hemberger, fashioned the red sandstone structure with the flourishes of early Gothic style. Spires, gargoyles and dragons carved by the imaginative local sculptor, Wilhelm Sauer, decorate the building.

Flooded with light, the interior of the main floor of the chapel features rows of columns, one on top of the other; the top row is made of shimmering black labradorite. Here you can admire Mourners' heads, carved from light yellow limestone, and other decorative elements are on display here. The transepts of the chapel are home to *three cenotaphs* (empty tombs that act as monuments) for Grand Duke Friedrich I, his wife Luise of Prussia and their son Ludwig Wilhelm. These cenotaphs were created from white Carrara marble by the Karlsruhe sculptor, Hermann Volz.

From the main floor of the church, a wide stairway leads down into the crypt. This houses the three magnificent coffins of Prince Ludwig Wilhelm, Grand Duke Friedrich I and his wife Luise of Prussia, as well as another 15 coffins of members of the house of Baden.

The sepulchral chapel ensemble includes the former guard house on the Klosterweg (monastery road). This is where the present-day visitor center is located, along with the ticket office and shop, as well as information about the burial place and the grand duke and duchess interred there.
